SECTION 1



WHAT IS THE PEER CIVIC YOUTH POLICY MONITORING FRAMEWORK?

The *Youth Policy Monitoring Framework* is a practical, youth-friendly tool for tracking progress on civic and policy priorities identified by young people. It is designed to be used as a direct progression from the ‘*Empowering Youth Voices: A Resolution for a Stronger Inclusive Europe*’ or any national Resolution document that Peer Civic partners may have prepared for local stakeholders. Beyond this, the framework can also be used by any youth group or advocacy organisation that wishes to monitor the degree to which decision-makers follow through on their commitments to youth issues.

The purpose of the framework is to

- ▶▶ Hold decision-makers accountable to the commitments they make
- ▶▶ Provide young people with a clear, realistic way to follow up
- ▶▶ Keep youth policy priorities visible and alive after the Erasmus+ project ends

In its simplest form, it is a youth-developed accountability checklist to enable young people, *(or relevant stakeholders)* to follow-up on the level of progress that civil and political actors have made regarding the representations they made on the priority issues affecting their lives. It offers young people and their allies a clear way of measuring progress when asked “*did this go anywhere?*”

What Will Be Monitored?

The monitoring plan sets out how young people will track progress of priorities in both their own country and at EU Level:

Who Is Monitoring Whom?



Q. Who is doing the monitoring?

A. Young people, youth workers, and supportive NGOs.



Q. Who is being monitored?

A. Politicians, policy makers, local or EU-level decision makers.



Q. Who holds the Monitoring Plan?

A. Youth groups, NGOs and the Peer Civic Platform

When and How Does Monitoring Take Place?

Monitoring takes place **from September 2025** and continues indefinitely after the Erasmus+ Peer Civic project has ended. Each partner country's foundational plan will specify when monitoring for specific actions commences along with a timetable to indicate frequency of monitoring. The plan also specifies **how monitoring may be undertaken** for example meeting with stakeholders or written submissions to EU representatives.



Is There a Standard Monitoring Plan Framework?

Section 2 provides a framework upon which each partner can build or customise their own monitoring plan. The frame outlines both the shared high-level EU priorities along with the priorities specific to your region as extrapolated from the **Youth Needs &B Priorities Survey 2025**.

Both the shared and region-specific priorities are documented in the EU Resolution titled **EMPOWERING YOUTH VOICES A Resolution for a Stronger Inclusive Europe** as presented to MEPs in March 2025. Although not necessary, young people may find it useful to create a separate *National Resolution* document to distinguish national priorities from the shared EU priorities. This can be adopted as an ever-green document which can be modified to include any new issues that may be identified at local stakeholder meetings but may not have emerged in the Needs Survey. This approach provides a mechanism for greater engagement with local and national parliamentarians and NGOs and provides a degree of flexibility to include unforeseen new issues or priorities affecting young people in individual countries that may arise over the coming years.



Who Will Lead This Work?

Each partner country will make local decisions regarding who will lead the monitoring process and clarify roles both before and after the Erasmus+ project ends. This will require answering questions such as:

- ▶ Which youth groups, youth workers or NGOs will follow up?
- ▶ Is there a proposed host or convenor for coordinating updates?
- ▶ Will any partner organisations provide support or training?

How Will We Engage with Decision Makers and What Tools Will We Use?

Similarly, each partner will decide the engagement activities it will undertake to hold decision-makers to account and the monitoring and tracking methodologies it will use. Deliberations may include:

- ▶ What in-person or online events will we organise?
- ▶ What logs and trackers will we use to document progress?

How Will Progress Updates Be Shared?

Finally, partners will make decisions regarding how the rate of progress on issues will be communicated to stakeholders. This will include deliberations regarding:

- ▶ Where will updates be published?
- ▶ Who will gather and post updates?
- ▶ What format will updates take?

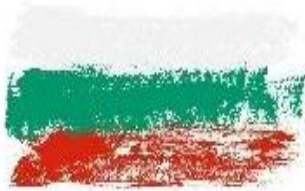

BULGARIA MONITORING PLAN

Date: July 2025

Purpose

This plan sets out how young people and youth workers in Bulgaria will follow up on civic and policy priorities identified during the Peer Civic project, particularly issues related to youth employment, trust in institutions, and skill-building. The plan is designed to ensure continued accountability after the project ends and to give young people a structured way to assess political follow-through.

Background

In 2025, young people from Bulgaria participated in structured surveys, workshops, and consultations to identify their top priorities. The most prominent issues included persistent youth unemployment, corruption and lack of institutional trust, and the need for practical education aligned with market needs. These issues were documented in the joint EU Resolution presented in Brussels, as well as in national discussions during local stakeholder meetings.

GREECE MONITORING PLAN

Purpose

This Monitoring Plan outlines how young people and civil society actors in Greece will follow up on key youth priorities identified during the Peer Civic project. The plan is aimed at holding national and local authorities accountable while creating channels for structured youth participation. Monitoring begins in **September 2025**, before the conclusion of the project, and will continue annually through youth-led and NGO-supported efforts.

Background

In 2025, Greek youth were engaged in consultations and surveys that highlighted three major areas of concern: **limited access to meaningful employment, inadequate education-to-employment transition mechanisms** and **the underrepresentation of vulnerable youth in public life**. These findings were further reinforced by stakeholder discussions during local and national Peer Civic events.

Purpose

This Monitoring Plan defines how young people and youth-serving organisations in Ireland will follow up on the national priorities established through the Peer Civic project. With housing, mental health, and civic participation emerging as urgent issues, the plan sets a clear structure to track government commitments and ensure continued youth involvement. Monitoring will commence in **September 2025** and continue through national and EU election cycles.

Background

Irish youth engaged in a survey, workshops, and a national stakeholder event (Fireside Dialogue, May 2025) as part of Peer Civic. Key issues highlighted included the housing crisis, inadequate youth mental health support, and the need for simplified access to EU opportunities. The national Youth Resolution was presented to elected representatives and formed the basis of this monitoring framework.

Purpose

This Monitoring Plan sets out how youth organisations and active young citizens in Italy will track progress on the civic and policy priorities they identified through the Peer Civic project. Key focus areas include functional illiteracy, democratic disengagement, and economic precarity — especially in Southern regions. Monitoring will begin in **September 2025**, before project close, and will support ongoing civic engagement across regional disparities.

Background

Through Peer Civic's consultations and surveys in 2025, Italian youth expressed deep concern over political disillusionment, weak civic education, and high youth unemployment — all of which fuelled intergenerational mistrust and emigration. A lack of accessible pathways into politics and poorly aligned education systems were also recurrent themes. These concerns were further explored in national events and dialogue forums coordinated by the Italian project team.

Purpose

This Monitoring Plan provides a structured framework to track youth priorities emerging from Peer Civic consultations in Romania. Key areas include youth outmigration, digital exclusion, and the need for strong youth representation at the national and EU level. Monitoring begins in **September 2025** to align with the final phase of the Erasmus+ project and ensure real-time accountability from national actors.

Background

In 2025, Romanian youth highlighted a strong demand for improved access to mental health services, equal opportunities, and meaningful participation in EU-level policy. The Peer Civic Youth Needs Survey revealed that young people—particularly in rural areas—face barriers accessing information and engaging with policymaking. National-level consultations emphasised a need to reverse the brain drain and build civic trust through decentralised, inclusive youth infrastructure.

Purpose

This Monitoring Plan outlines how youth stakeholders in Spain will follow up on the key priorities identified during the Peer Civic project. With youth unemployment, weak career pathways, and regional disparities emerging as dominant themes, this plan aims to support a nationwide youth accountability process. Monitoring activities will begin in **September 2025** to ensure timely engagement before the project ends.

Background

Through the 2025 Peer Civic Youth Survey and stakeholder dialogues, Spanish youth consistently ranked first-job experience, career guidance, and place-based investment as urgent national issues. The data revealed an appetite for stronger local job creation and youth participation in designing territorial development. These concerns are reflected in the EU Resolution and grounded in Spain's own socio-economic context.

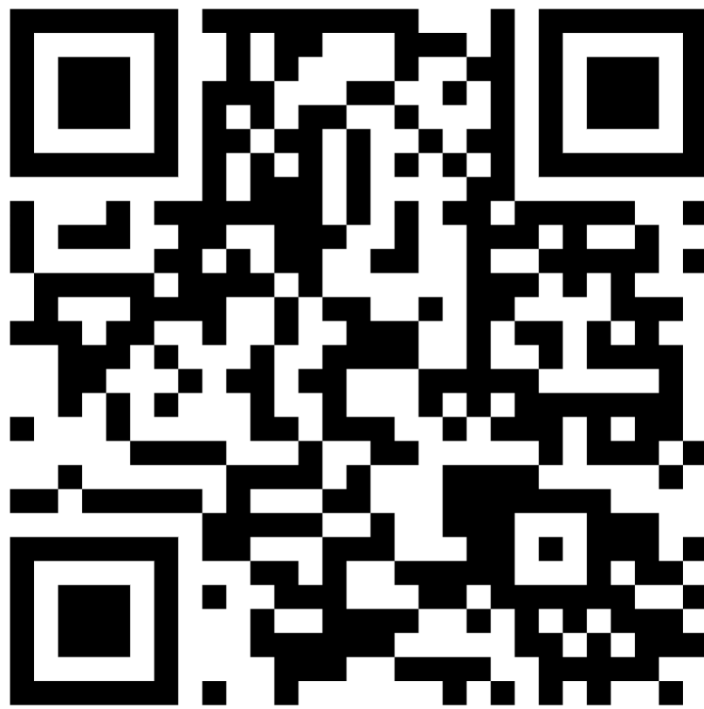

 - Coordination with youth-led economic initiatives and employability networks
